Fast Facts:

- BAFSC established as an independent group in 2011
- BAFSC is funded by Ontario Trillium Foundation grant
- Burlington has the highest percentage of seniors within the four municipalities of Halton
- One in six residents (17%) in Burlington is a senior
- 30% of seniors are over the age of 80
- 60% of those over 80 are women

- A Burlington Age-Friendly Audit was done and identifies the strengths, barriers and needs for Burlington to be an Age-Friendly City

- BAFSC is a member of the Ontario Network of Age-Friendly Communities of Practice
- Resources and wide variety of communication and information made available
- Partnership with Volunteer Halton to develop and operate the Senior Ambassador Connector Program
- Partnership with Burlington Public Library, Brant Hills Public School and Chartwell Brant Centre Long
 Term Care Centre to develop and run the Grandpal Program, an intergenerational activity
